# Saved By Grace Through Faith

"For grace you have been saved by faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" Ephesians 2: 8



Often at a young age we are taught certain table manners. One of the rules of mealtime is that one should not talk about *politics or religion*. We know this because for many of us, these topics have encouraged divisions between us. I can't speak for the topic of politics, but when it comes to religion this can be tragic. It is so often in our discussions with each other that we learn and grow and our children learn the important things in our life. When we, as a rule, keep the discussion of faith from our dinner tables, I wonder if our children learn that *faith is not important enough to discuss*.

In worship we have been discussing how to re-claim that ability to discuss our faith with each other, thereby giving ourselves, and our children opportunities to grow spiritually.

A few guidelines are important: 1) It is O.K. to disagree. The Bible teaches us that the early church consistently disagreed with each other. We also know that out of those disagreements came learning, spiritual growth and the strengthening of the church; 2) Everybody has gifts of faith that others can learn from, and, everybody has limitations (nobody speaks for God). 3) Love is the starting point for all our work. When we follow Jesus' teaching, that we are to love each other as Christ loved us, then we need not be threatened by our differences or disagreements. They can become tools of grace in the hands of a loving God. So I encourage you to talk, with your children, with each other about issues of faith.

# Something New Is Coming To Our Redeemer's

At the January 19 meeting the Ad Council approved proceding with the Natural Church Development program designed to measure the health of our church family. Additional details about the program will be mailed to all members in February and presented in church in March.

To initiate the program, 30 active attendees will be recruited to complete a survey about our church. The volunteers will include 3 groups: those who have attended from 2-10 years; 10-19 years; and 20 or more years. The survey will be done in March and will require an hour or less to complete.

The steering committee that has developed the schedule includes **Pastor Bill**, **Sherrie Cottrell**, **Sharon Clermont** and **Ralph Will**. They would like to add four more members to implement the program and determine action required, based on the results of the survey.

### "Natural Church Development"

by the NCD Steering Committee

Natural Church Development (NCD) is the result of a worldwide church growth research project. The research looked at growing and non-growing churches, and from this research has discovered "Eight Quality Characteristics" that can be the key to growing churches. Churches from a total of 32 countries participated in this research project. Each participating church asked 30 of its members to complete a survey which produced 4.2 million responses. The NCD process grew out of the analysis of these responses.

Much additional information will be presented before the pastor and members of ORUMC will be asked to evaluate the following eight characteristics of *Our Redeemer's* church.

- 1. Empowering Leadership
- 2. Gift-oriented Ministry
- 3. Passionate Spirituality
- 4. Functional Structures
- 5. Inspiring Worship Service
- 6. Holistic Small Groups
- 7. Need-oriented Evangelism
- 8. Loving Relationships

The completed surveys will be evaluated by Conference Staff and they will then assign a NCD Coach to discuss the next steps with us. A "Minimum Factor" will be a result of this process.

You will learn much more about this "Minimum Factor" as we introduce more details about this program.

There will be a presentation on Natural Church Development on February 8 from 7:00-9:30 p.m. at Epworth UMC in Elgin. All who are interested are invited to attend.

### (Continuing the Fight against Hunger)

Have you noticed that *Our Redeemer's* has a tradition of combating hunger? Our long history of "caring ministries" includes participation in the annual CROP Walk, serving at the Rogers Park Soup Kitchen, supporting the Society of St. Andrews and stocking the Schaumburg Township Food Pantry. Our church's youth will soon be participating in the "Thirty Hour Famine". And our congregation's missionary, Richard Vales, sold all that he had to minister to the hungry in the Philippines.

Micah Ministries, our new social justice ministry group, is continuing this tradition of battling hunger. The emphasis of Micah Ministries will be centered more on examining and combating the roots of hunger. Upcoming meetings will explore existing hunger ministries, such as United Power for Action and Justice, Church World Service, and Bread for the World. In addition, Micah Ministries will be sponsoring a Lenten study series based on the book Ending Hunger Now by Bob Dole and George McGovern. The Lenten series will be held on Tuesday evenings 7:00-8:30 p.m. on March 7,14,21,28, and April 4. Upcoming Micah Ministry meetings will be held on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 p.m. on February 7, 28, April 18 and May 16.

All church members are invited and encouraged to join in our Micah Ministries and to participate in our Lenten study. For we know that Christ Himself wants sometime to say, "I was hungry and you gave me food." (Matt. 25:35)

### Thirteenth Annual Meals For Millions Lenten Program

Meals for Millions is a mission project for the United Methodist Men, sponsored by the Society of St. Andrew. UMM have provided literally millions of meals of potatoes and other food to the hungry through fund raising activities.

The funds are used to salvage and transport food (especially potatoes), that are perfectly good to eat but which are not suitable for use by processing plants due to size or shape.

All members and friends of *Our Redeemer's* are invited to join the Society of St. Andrew in a program of spiritual reflection and action to fight hunger during Lent. During last year's Lenten season *Our Redeemer's* raised \$1440. Since 1994 *Our Redeemer's* has raised over \$19,000.

This year's Lenten devotion entitled "Crossroads" can help you grow spiritually and provide an opportunity to feed the hungry. Money saved from "giving up something" during Lent will go to the Society of St. Andrew to provide food for the hungry.

The Lenten devotion program will begin Ash Wednesday, March 1 and will conclude with a Good Friday Fast on April 14.

### Finance Report

The following is the year end report for 2005. Final congregational giving is \$299,997 or 9% below expected in budget. The Christmas offering was \$3,100. The Sprint rent was \$25,338. Including the other income, the total income was \$362,000 or 5% below budget.

The total expenses were \$351,000 or 7% below budget. We ended the year in the black, thanks to the hard work of committees to keep expenses under budget. Special thanks to the Trustees who were significantly below budget.

Total budget for 2006 will be \$369,000 compared to the 2005 budget of \$379,000. The 2006 budget is lower because Staff Parish has taken the salary for an Associate/Education Pastor out of budget.

New co-chairmen for Finance are Fred Utne and John Machonis.

### Religious Outreach Award

In addition, ChildServ recognized the *Our Redeemer's* congregation with the Religious Outreach Award at their annual meeting in November. This is given to a congregation who has supported ChildServ with

monetary gifts, donations-in-kind (such as Gifts from the Heart and the Easter baskets), and service to the organization. This award is not given every year. In looking at past recipients, those congregations have been much larger than *Our Redeemer's*. However, *Our Redeemer's* for the past several years have provided nearly 13% of the gifts for their Christmas gift giving program through our program, Gifts from the Heart.

This year 92 families provided 145 children with presents.
