## Pastor's Corner

### Lent: *A Time for Connection*



February 6 begins our season of Lent. During that time we as followers of Christ are asked to prepare ourselves for Easter. The purpose of our preparation is not only to be ready for Easter Sunday, with family and friends and in worship, but to know again the *new life* that is available to us as we live out our faith in Jesus Christ. *New life is New*. The resurrection we know at Easter time is not just a first century phenomenon, but is the working of God's spirit in our hearts, our lives and our ministry.

At *Our Redeemer's* this year we would like to offer 2 opportunities for you to grow in the new life of grace we celebrate at Easter. The first concerns the church's emphasis to minister to those who are hungry. During Christmas last month our church again contributed over \$5,000 toward the Heifer Project (a program that provides livestock and seed). This is our 4th year in achieving this level of giving and becoming an "Ark Church." During Lent we want to continue our support for

our hunger ministry to those who are in need of food with the following:

**Food Pantry:** I would challenge us all this year to fill up our food pantry container (which goes to the Schaumburg food pantry). These contributions are an important way we minister to those in need within our own community.

**Super Bowl of Caring:** On February 3 there is a football game being played in Phoenix this year. Our youth group has led us in this effort to use this opportunity to help those who are in need. Bring one can for our pantry at the church with a dollar wrapped around it. Both contributions will help provide food for those in our local community.

**United Methodist Men's Lenten Study:** Our Men's group sponsors a Lenten devotional book and an opportunity to give to the Society of St. Andrew (an interfaith hunger-fighting ministry). The devotional books can be picked up in our lobby area after each worship service. (cont. on pg. 2)

**30-Hour Famine:** Each year our youth group meets for a weekend, fasts for 30 hours, and raises money to fight world hunger. During the time they fast they stay at church for fellowship, activities and Bible Study. We are all asked to contribute and to sign up to help during the weekend of the fast (from contributions to being prayer partners). Also, make sure and attend worship on February 10 to hear the testimonies of those who have been part of the fast.

By being part of these ministries we affirm both the hope and the faith that we know in our spirit, with concrete actions of giving (Matthew 25: 31-46; Isaiah 58: 6-12).

The second opportunity we would like to share with you is our ***New Life Bible Study***. On Monday February 11 we will begin our Lenten Bible study focusing on the importance of forgiveness and reconciliation. The class will meet from 7:00 – 8:30 p.m. each Monday from February 11 through March 10 (5 sessions). During the study we will look at spiritual leaders who have struggled with forgiveness (i.e., **Elie Wiesel, Thomas Moore, Marianne Williamson**). We will also look at specific incidents of forgiveness (tragic shooting of students at an Amish school in 2006, Northern Ireland, etc.).

Please join our church family as we take advantage of each of these opportunities.

## Big or Small — Your Commitment Says It All

The focus at *Our Redeemer's* in February is on fighting hunger. Beginning the first weekend, February 3 - Super Bowl Sunday is also Souper Bowl Sunday. Not only can you satisfy your own hunger at the United Methodist Men's Spaghetti Dinner, but when you bring a can of soup, fruit, vegetables, or other non-perishable food and a dollar, you contribute to *Our Redeemer's* food pantry to fight hunger locally in our own neighborhoods.

The second weekend, February 8-10, is the 30-hour Famine. The youth will be participating in a 30 hour fast (only water and juice for nourishment!) to increase their own and our awareness of the costs of hunger in the world. If you want to help, you can bring water or juice or other supplies. If you have a little more time, you could be a prayer partner for one of the hungry participants or help with some of the activities which range from prayerful to educational to just plain fun. (Sign up in the Narthex) I have been a prayer partner in the past. It's satisfying to see the links that grow stronger within the group during the 30 hours. Their enthusiasm at the end when they break the fast is fun to be part of. And the sanctuary on Sunday filled with orange streamers is just awesome.

Maybe you will be inspired to do more.

You might join UMM's study of Tony Dungy's book *Quiet Strength*. Or during Lent, participate in the Society of St. Andrew's work against hunger with a bank and Lenten devotions. Both Micah Ministries and Caring Ministries also have initiatives underway to fight hunger and poverty that contributes to it - from using fair trade coffee and other products to book studies to serving at a soup kitchen or PADS to writing letters to lawmakers. It's your choice based on the time you are able to commit.

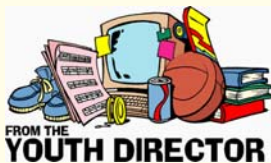

## **30-Hour Famine** *February 8-9*

World Vision's 30-Hour Famine is here again. February 8-9, 2008, with Famine Sunday being February 10. This is the 7th year that the youth of ORUMC have participated in this amazing event. Any Jr. or Sr. High student can participate and of course we welcome adults to help or participate as well! We do this event through World Vision and all proceeds go to that non-profit organization. There are 29,000 children that die everyday from hunger and hunger related causes and we are working to bring down that number. World Vision goes into a community and teaches the people to live off the land—to make it on their own. This is what the students raise money for. The weekend goes as follows:

### **Friday**

3:00 p.m. Students begin fast on their own  
6:00 p.m. Students arrive at church

### **Saturday**

9:00 p.m. Students break fast together with prayer partners, family, and the congregation with a potluck dinner.

There is a sign up sheet in the narthex for adults who would like to help throughout the weekend, be a prayer partner, or donate 100% fruit juice or water. ## Fifteenth Annual Meals For Millions Lenten Program

Meals for Millions is a mission project for the United Methodist Men, sponsored by the Society of St. Andrew. UMM have provided literally millions of meals of potatoes and other food to the hungry through fund raising activities.

The funds are used to salvage and transport food (especially potatoes), that are perfectly good to eat but which are not suitable for use by processing plants due to size or shape.

### ORUMC - A Rainbow Covenant Church (Again)

Once again in 2007, *Our Redeemer's* was a "Rainbow Covenant Church". That means that we paid 100% of our apportionments—our financial obligation to the United Methodist Church itself. But it also means we went the "extra mile" by going on to support mission projects across the spectrum.

There are eight "colors" in the rainbow covenant—eight types of mission projects to support. Those are International Advance projects (Burgundy), U.S.A. Advance projects (Red), United Methodist Committee on Relief (Orange), The Children's Fund (Yellow), Northern Illinois Conference benevolences (Green), District projects (Blue), Support of Missionary Personnel (Indigo), and Special Sunday offerings (Purple).

We can take some pride in this accomplishment. You, the congregation fulfilled your financial responsibilities, allowing the church to fully pay its apportionments. But the extra mile giving came from our church's special blessing—our cell tower cross fund. Years ago our administrative council voted to tithe that income, giving half to Richard Vales' WWJD Ministry" (see accompanying article) and putting half toward the rainbow covenant.

Thanks to that extra income and to a commitment toward the Rainbow Covenant

on the part of **Pastor Bill Shaw** and the finance committee, *Our Redeemer's* has been a "Rainbow Covenant Church" every year since 2000, the beginning of the new millennium. The goal now, of course, is to continue the tradition each year for the *rest* of the millennium!

Richard is a former member of our church who traveled to an impoverished area of the Philippines on a business trip in the early 1990s. He heard, and he followed a call to serve the hungry children he saw there—leaving his home, selling his business, and his possessions. Although now in his eighties, Richard has been serving tirelessly ever since.

*Our Redeemer's* has been formally supporting Richard and his “What Would Jesus Do?” ministry for three years now. We make our contribution through a tithe of our cell tower income (see accompanying article.) This past year we were able to send Richard three \$500 checks to help him feed the hungry.

1) How about installing a rain barrel? A rain barrel attaches to a down spout and keeps rain water from flooding your yard, yet is accessible for watering your flowers and vegetables. 2) Research native plants of Illinois on the internet. Native plants have a longer root system and require less water during times of drought.

3) Consider planting some broccoli, leaf lettuce or onions in amongst the flowers. They’re good to eat and look good, too.
