Rev Elizabeth Resigns

Sunday, December 11, Doug Meneely, Staff Parish co-chair, announced during church that Rev. Elizabeth Bowes has resigned. Her last Sunday will be January 8. Doug read her resignation letter as follows.

Wednesday, December 7, 2011

Dear Staff-Parish Committee,

I am writing you to inform you that I am resigning from my position of Minister of Christian Education at Our Redeemer's United Methodist Church. I have been offered and accepted the newly created position of Minister of Discipleship at Glen Ellyn First United Methodist Church effective Sunday, January 15, 2012. This new job is an opportunity for me to plan, develop and oversee a small group discipleship system with the objective of creating intentional discipleship growth for adults and young adults. It also includes the oversight of all adult Christian education.

This allows me to move into the area that I see as my specialty, which is adult and young adult education and discipleship. It is the ministry I feel called to and that I am passionate about. It is the ministry I went to seminary for and I am trained in.

This was not an easy decision for me to make as I love Our Redeemer's and I love the people here. I was not expecting to leave Our Redeemer's for a long time.

The new opportunity appeared totally unexpected and aligns more closely with my areas of interest. In our two years together we have experienced a lot. While at times it was not comfortable, we both have grown in ways I suspect neither of us imagined. I see God's hand in it all.

Time is precious. Ask the coach whose team is behind in the final seconds of a game (*Do you remember the football game Bears vs. Broncos on Sunday, 12/11/11? Ouch~*). Ask the air traffic controller in charge of scheduling takeoffs and landings at a major airport. Ask the news reporter who has just received a breaking story from the AP wire. Ask the cancer patient who has recently learned he has only two months left to live.

Time management is an oxymoron. Time is beyond our control, and the clock keeps ticking regardless of how we lead our lives. Priority management is the answer to maximizing the time we have. Our days are identical suitcases—all the same size—but some can pack more into them than others. No one has a magical ability to make time, but if our lives have direction, we can make the most of the moments we have been given.

Time is more valuable than money, because time is irreplaceable. "You don't really pay for things with money," says author Charles Spezzano in *What to Do between* *Birth and Death.* "You pay for them with time." We exchange our time for dollars when we go to work and then trade our dollars



for everything we purchase and accumulate. In essence, all we possess can be traced back to an investment of time.

How do you want to invest your time in 2012? The year 2012 is the year of Dragon symbolizing courage to face challenges for success and an intelligent, laborious worker who never puts aside work. If eel like the year 2012 is the year of ORUMC made up with intelligent, laborious servant-leaders who never put aside work and who face challenges boldly for its mission—make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, and its vision—be the home welcoming, nurturing, and celebrating God and everyone. Everyone is counted here!

Each of us is like a piece in a giant jigsaw puzzle; every piece has its place in God's plan. No piece is optional. How frustrating it would be to put together a 1,000-piece puzzle, only to find one piece missing at the end! That's how God sees us, as a wonderful puzzle made up entirely of incredibly important pieces. Everyone is necessary to complete the divine puzzle. When all the pieces fit together, the world can see a beautiful, completed portrait of the heart of Jesus, beating for people everywhere.
