#### Disciples vs. Christians

While reclaiming our call to the life of discipleship on Sunday, March 25, we distinguished between being Disciples from being Christians. After that Sunday, I was asked to elaborate on the idea in my upcoming FROG newsletter article if possible. As we know, everything is possible in Christ. So, I am here to do so.

The origin of the term "Christian" is given in Acts 11:25-26. It is comparatively rare, appearing only three times in the Bible (Acts 11:26, Acts 26:28 and 1 Peter 4:16). The word "Christian" derives from the Greek word "Christ" describing a person who professes Jesus as Christ—Messiah, Lord and Savior. The word focuses on the state of "being" more than the state of "doing" in the linguistic approach of the word. It gives more weight to the Great Commandment (Matthew 22:36-40) than the Great Commission



(Matthew 28:16-20). The born of "this being" is the work of the Holy Spirit. It is personal and also it can be privatized. Not like Christians, however, disciples cannot be privatized. A disciple is a follower or a doer of the lessons learned, who emphasizes the Great Commission. Here at *Our Redeemer's* United Methodist Church (ORUMC) we are talking about the Disciples of Jesus Christ.

Can the person be a Christian without being a disciple? YES. The person who does nothing about one's belief in Jesus Christ falls into this category. Does this person have eternal life? YES. According to John 3:16, whoever believes in Jesus Christ will have eternal life.

Can the person be a disciple without being a Christian? Yes and No. Among Jesus' 12 disciples, there was Judas who followed (cont on pg 2)

Jesus for 3 years, learned everything Jesus taught, and yet he did not put his heart in learning or following Jesus. He had his own agenda. When Jesus did not satisfy him or his agenda, he turned his back on Jesus and betrayed him. In the 21st Century, we still have "Judas" in church who imposes one's own agenda seeking one's own glory or satisfaction in following or doing what Jesus taught. So, I say "Yes" that the person can be a disciple without being a Christian.

On the other hand, I would say "No" that the person cannot be a disciple without being

a Christian since the TRUE discipleship requires wholesome/total commitment and submission to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Also, I believe that TRUE Christians [True Lovers of God] cannot privatize their faith/ love by doing nothing about their faith/love. We do something about our belief if we truly believe in something. By doing something about what we believe, we are confirming our faith in it. I believe that being and doing cannot be separated. We do what we do because we are who we are. What we do defines who we are [Disciple-Christians] and who we are directs the course of our action in life/ministry [Christian-Disciples].

Through the Reverse Tithing program we had at ORUMC, I've witness of this concept of being "Christian-Disciples" and "Disciple-Christians" plays out well in pursuing the mission/vision of ORUMC. In the beginning of the program many of us did not know what to do with the \$20 gift of grace we received from the church. Some families went through periods of frustration, and yet they all did something with it as a recipient of the grace. The following is the summary of the program becoming "Christian-Disciples" and "Disciple-Christians" as of 4/18/12:

• How People Invested: Matching the \$20 gift of grace; Purchase some raffle tickets for fundraising; Blow snow on neighbor's walks and driveways; Candy Bar Sale; Pheasant - Veggie Burger Sale; Pot with Plant Sale; Hand-Knitted Dish Cloth Sale; Been blessed day after receiving the "Divine" envelope; Handmade Necklace Sale; "Pretend" Higher Interest Rates; Bought stripper, stain, varnish to refurnish tables for church member; VBS invitation; ORUMC's Food Pantry; helping neighbors who are in need of extra grace in life; Partner with mission driven organization that matched with ORUMC's such as Micro Lending; 4 Paws for Ability (the agency that trains dogs for helping people with autism); First United Methodist Church of Winchester, Indiana which is in crisis: K-Love Christian Radio Station; Feeding America Program; Rogers Park United Methodist Church Community Dinner; Society of St. Andrew to feed the hungry; MS Walk; World Vision 30 Hour Famine; Local food pantries; UMCOR; and a Nursing Home.

I am so proud of many "Christian-Disciples" and "Disciple-Christians" at ORUMC who have done and still do something about their faith in Christ faithfully and creatively to meet the mission/vision of ORUMC. Just let me know if you are interested in having one of the "Christian-Disciples" or "Disciple-Christians" to be your mentor or coach in your faith journey. I am more than happy to connect you up with these Godly people. Once you see what I see and experience what I am experiencing at ORUMC, your faith journey with ORUMC would give you amazing thrill to live your life as "Christian-Disciple" or "Disciple-Christian"! I pray that you will have this amazing thrill in your life by fully relying on God!

# How-to article: 9 easy steps to online giving

Online giving can be an important part of making stewardship easy for you and your family. This article will help you understand how to set up online giving.


1. Grab your checkbook or savings account statement. You will need the bank routing number and the account number. More on how to find those numbers later.

2. Navigate to our church's website www.orumc.org. While you're there, check out all of the new content and things that are happening at our church. You can also like us on Facebook!

3. Click on the blue online giving button at the top right.

4. Create your online profile so that you can log in next time. Enter an email address and then fill in your name/address info and create a password.



#### 5. Click add a transaction



6. In this next section, you can choose how to direct your funds and choose when

and how often you give. The General Operating line is our overall church budget. The other three lines are for specific initiatives we have underway at this time. There are several options for donation frequency:

- One-time single donation
- Weekly donation that occurs on the same *day* each week
- Monthly donation that occurs on the same *date* each month
- Semi-monthly-donation that occurs on the 1st and 15th of each month

You can select the start date of your donation. Note that this date must be a weekday (and not a bank holiday). Click continue

7. On the next page, you will input your banking information. Choose checking or savings account. If you choose checking account, the screen will show an image of a check. Use this image to help you find your bank routing number and account number. Enter this information as shown.



8. Click process. This will confirm your account info and show you a confirmation screen.

9. The next time you want to give online, you simply log in and do step 6. It's that simple!

### Finance Factoid ORUMC May 2012

In an effort to be fiscally transparent and increase understanding among the congregation members at ORUMC concerning the finances of the church, the Finance Committee has decided to provide brief explanations, updates and other finance related information in the newsletter called FINANCE FACTOIDS. This is the first in a series of FACTOIDS. Enjoy!

The ORUMC annual budget is about \$350,000/yr.

A little over 90% of our budget is allocated to three areas:

- Salaries, wages and benefits for our wonderful staff- 59%
- Maintenance, repairs, utilities, insurance, housekeeping and lawn service for the church and parsonage (Trustees)- 21%
- Denominational Missions and District operations (Apportionments) and benevolences (Rainbow Covenant) – 11%


