The General Conference and the Methodists

Two significant events are happening within the life of our church. In May 10-26, 2016, the General Conference will convene in Portland, Oregon to celebrate, re-define mission, and affirm our call "To go therefore and make disciples of all.." (Matthew 28:19) The General Conference brings together the people called "Methodist". Another date to bear in mind is May 24. Every year, we lift up "Aldersgate Sunday" to remind us of the experience of John Wesley. In 1738, he returned from the mission field in America, heart broken and seeking new directions for ministry to all. It was at this event in a fellowship meeting that his "heart was strangely warmed." According to his journal, "I felt I did trust in Christ. Christ alone, for salvation.."

Who are the people called Methodists? Where did we get the "United" in Methodist?" Originally, the term "Methodist" was a label attached to a group of students who

formed a "holy club" in London during the time of Charles and John Wesley. (Charles Wesley composed many beautiful hymns that are familiar to many.) The "Methodists"



followed a pattern of daily spiritual discipline and commitment to serve the poor and the outcasts. Many years later, in the United States, Pastor Boehm and Pastor Otterbein embraced saying "Wir sind Brüder!" (we are brethren!). The followers of the Brethren were influenced by the theology of Wesley. The Brethren united with another movement and finally because of shared vision, formed "The United Methodist Church."

Here is an excerpt from Garrison Keillor –*A Prairie Home Companion*—On the Methodists:

We make fun of Methodists for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed, and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese.

But nobody sings like them. Many

Methodists are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage.

It's natural for Methodists to sing in harmony. We are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A7th and D7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other.

odists, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you can call up when you're in deep distress.

- * If you're dying, they will comfort you.
- * If you are lonely, they'll talk to you.
- * Methodists believe in prayer, but would practically die if asked to pray out loud.
- * Methodists like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.

They were Jimmy Stewardship (of Hollywood fame) and his personal angel-in-waiting – Clarence. They were both impressed with all the smiles, warmth, and generosity that is present at ORUMC. So much so that they have agreed to be our leaders for the 2016 fall stewardship campaign! Jimmy's past with his role in It's a Wonderful Life as George Bailey exemplifies what it means to give one's time, talents, and gifts to our Heavenly Father. As a young man, George saved the life of his younger brother and the life of a young boy who had been prescribed an incorrect medicine for his illness.

In his adult life, George sacrificed his big dream of becoming a world traveler by remaining in his small home town to manage the local bank. 

ORUMC Summer Missions 2016 Appalachia Service Project And Disaster Relief Efforts

This summer, the youth and adults of *Our Redeemer's* UMC have the privilege of serving Christ through two important mission opportunities.

First, on June 11, we are sending 20 youth and adults to the Appalachia Region as part of the Appalachia Service Project (ASP). This is a home repair ministry with the goal to make homes "warmer, safer and drier" for those in need.

Then on July 16, approximately 35 adult volunteers will help with disaster relief efforts in Detroit, MI. They are still trying to recover from their record-breaking rainfalls that caused major flooding in August of 2014.

We need your help for both of these trips. It will cost about \$12,000 for the ASP Team and we estimate about \$9,000 for the Adult Mission Team. We are asking that you sponsor these youth and adults who have committed a week of their summer to serve Christ through serving others.
