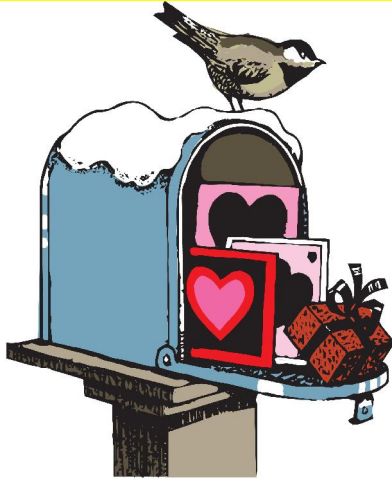


Dear Friends in Christ,

In few more weeks, it is going to be a year since we had a major disruption to our way of life as a church. As I look toward the future I wonder what we can become in the new normal. Here is the thing. Knowing what you should do to be in ministry as a church in normal times is hard enough; trying to figure out what to do in the midst of a pandemic (or after it) is so much more complicated. That's why I think we need to chart a course that will get us where we imagine ourselves to be in the future. As I have said, the future is coming at us and it is coming fast. I wonder how much of what's going on now is permanent? People in the midst of a revolution often don't realize they're in the midst of a revolution. It's not like people woke up on November 1st, 1517, the day after Martin Luther nailed his 95 thesis to a cathedral

door, and said "Hey, it's day 2 of the Reformation." No one knew the Reformation had started. They didn't realize a huge shift was underway that would change the course not just of the church, but of society. Luther's 95 thesis seemed like anomalies, until, of course, they weren't. The Covid-19 disruption has accelerated cultural disruption. Work, school, shopping, dining, exercising, entertainment won't be the same again. Neither will church. And whether you and I like change or not is kind of irrelevant. Culture never asks permission to change. It just changes. And boy, we are changing fast. We are more dependent on technology than ever to deal with these new times. (unfortunately, church people have the reputation for being "late adopters" of technology, and that must be reversed or we are left behind... no rapture for us) Businesses

have adapted and changed. (Let's be the first to change, not the last. Let's act sooner rather than later.) One thing will remain: doing church online. It is here to stay. We know that once we will gather for in-person worship we will continue to live-stream our services

offering support and presence to people who need it and who cannot join in person gatherings. What a great opportunity to minister to people not only in our city but people located anywhere in the world!

I believe that if we can see the future of our church and ministries and activities now, we have a better chance of seizing them. As a church we will have the opportunity to be a visible presence not only inside our sanctuary but on line, in our parking lot and back yard!

We are blessed to be located in a neighborhood filled with young families. Once the weather starts changing and vaccination speeds us, there will be ample opportunities for us to connect with our neighbors in the outdoors. How about organizing weekly parking lot and yard activities and start inviting our neighbors. If we're prepared and sensitive to the Holy Spirit, there will certainly be tremendous opportunities for gospel-centered conversations. Let's not squander this time waiting to go across the ocean to talk to people about Jesus. Let's seize the moment to walk across our yards and streets. Not only will our church be energized, but our

neighborhood kids are also watching and learning about missions through our words and actions. Missions isn't a trip we go on; it's a lifestyle we live. While we wait for a return of physically going, let's not waste the opportunities God has put before us now.

Dear friends, I truly believe that the time has arrived to leave behind the idea of a being a lone ranger Christian. This pandemic has revealed to us that we need to be in relationship with other people. Community in the church and the neighborhood is the green house for discipleship to flourish. Let's stop with the idea that it's "just me and Jesus." When things get loosened up, when it is OK to gather together again let us have every church member involved in a small group, bible study, book study and the whole church involved in neighborhood mission.

The sky's the limit. Can we reshuffle the cards? I see possibilities here. I say "let's just bring back those things that are mission-central. People are living with change now more than ever. They know the "new normal" will be... well "new." If there was ever a time to change what wasn't working, this is it. And this is the time to bring new initiatives. As we all know, old models rarely do well in new eras. And it seems we have entered a new era. Those who will open new restaurants or new businesses after Covid-19 will use a very

different approach: more indoor dining or patio space? Take out or delivery? Or helping people create their own food experiences? What about the church? I think that going back to Sunday worship with a few midweek (group) meetings will be a thing of the past. I believe Sundays will continue to be really significant gathering and worship days for our church, but it won't stop there. If people live every day in need of hope and resources to live out their faith (or to find faith) every day, we must start coming alongside people every day because people need to find faith and live out their faith every day. So maybe we need new models of connections for our different constituents every day. What will that look like?

We have momentum now to start fueling what's working and what's possible. Let's try to figure it out. Maybe we need to look at non-traditional ways of doing and growing our ministries? Corporate worship will always be a rallying point, but the gospel mission of the body will require all of us, all the body. We are interdependent. There are no spare parts. No spectators. No unimportant days. No second-class callings. Each one of us needs to answer Jesus' call: "Come and Follow Me." Will you answer His call?

Whether you are intending to give up chocolate, fast food, or the Internet, ORUMC would like to encourage you to do something generous this Lent, too and partner with *Midwest Mission* to help brothers and sisters in need.

Midwest Mission is one of nine cooperating depots in the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) Supply Network. Midwest Mission distributes UMCOR supplies in response to disasters within the United States. The supplies are sent locally, nationally, and internationally to those in need during a time of crisis.

Midwest Mission urgent needs at this moment are: toothpaste (2.5 oz or larger) and liquid laundry detergent (32-64 oz.) Please, bring the items to the church from Ash Wednesday to Easter.

CARING MINISTRIES

Like so many other matters, our church's Caring Ministries program has been profoundly affected by the pandemic. Many of our caring ministries (eg Habitat for Humanity, PADS, Rogers Park Soup Kitchen) are simply not practical at this time. Others, such as Gifts from the Heart and Heifer Project (both at Christmas) Prayer Shawl Ministry and Meals on Wheels remain active. Our church is certainly striving to make Appalachian Service Project work this year!

One Caring Ministry that is back in business is the Schaumburg Township Food Pantry. They had been temporarily scaled back significantly as they remodeled and enlarged. Their project is complete and they are accepting food donations once again. They, of course, also gladly accept monetary contributions, as they preferred during their remodeling. We will publicize their most-needed items on a frequent basis. Due to the pandemic we can no longer leave our donations at the church for our weekly deliverers. Members can deliver their own donations to the pantry at 1 North Illinois Boulevard, just north of Schaumburg Road. (Our church still has "Donated in the name of Christ by Our Redeemer's United Methodist Church" stickers available to put on each item.)

One possible Pandemic Caring Ministry discussed at the January Administrative Council was a "reverse fundraiser" for local restaurants. Many restaurants upon our request have helped Our Redeemer's fundraising by contributing a portion of our

payment back to the church. Perhaps we, as a church congregation, can help those and other worthy local restaurants by making an effort to order food from them, letting them know we support them and pray for their success. If you would be interested in helping organize such an effort, please notify Donna at the church office.

Finally, our Caring Ministries program has ALWAYS been open to new ideas for caring ministries from members willing to then organize and promote this, their passion. If you have a "Pandemic Caring Ministry" idea you would like to discuss (or would like to help with an existing ministry) please feel free to notify Bruce Bedingfield.

Volunteers are needed to travel to Chattam and spend the day doing carpentry, bike repair, etc. All tools are provided. The facility is large allowing for social distancing.

With the Covid situation, the trip is currently on hold. We will discuss the options at our Zoom meeting and try to plan for a trip.
