"Hear, O Israel: The LORD is our God, the LORD alone. You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words that

I am commanding you today in your heart. Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

(Deuteronomy 6:4-8)

This is the *Shema Prayer* from the *To-rah. Shema* (õhearö) is the Hebrew word that begins this prayer, which is the most important invocation in Judaism. This prayer begins with the command to õHear.ö For centuries, families have followed this practice. As a re-



minder that the love of God must always be the most important goal in human life, these verses are printed on a small piece of parchment paper, then rolled up and inserted into a decorative cylinder called a *Mezuzah*. The *Mezuzah* is then placed at the doorpost of the home, so that, each morning and each night, as Godøs people go out and into the house, they can place their hands and touch a small object to remind them of who they are... and whose they are.

This month, even though Covid-19 continues, we will still be observing our own reminder of the *Shema*. Each September, here at ORUMC, the church sets aside one special day at the end of the summer, to õrallyö, to õdraw together for a common purposeö as the Merriam-Webster dictionary defines it.

Due to the Covid situation, the Work Date Is Yet To Be Determined

At previous meetings we have discussed a possible **United Methodist Men** work trip to the Midwest Mission Center at Chattam, IL.

The Mission Center supplies disaster relief materials to events such as the Texas weather issues. A variety of work at the mission can be done by volunteers ranging from packaging relief materials to carpentry and repair jobs.

Tools are available for the various jobs. The facility is large enough that there is no problem keeping social distancing even with 20 or so people working together.

UMM president, **Rich Hill**, is attempting to schedule a work date (**probably not until the fall**) and is **inviting the whole church to participate.**

The facility only works Monday through Friday. The plan would be to travel to Chattam, about a 3 hour trip, on a Friday morning (date to be determined) leaving church at about 8:00 a.m. We would spend the day working, stay overnight at the facility and travel home Saturday morning.

The overnight facility can handle up to 16

people. 4 dorm rooms are available sleeping a total of 16 (4 to a room) with up to 12 on the lower level (4 on upper bunks)

RV sites are also available.



To My Fellow Administrative Council Members,

Our world, our nation, and our church are going through difficult times!

I am forwarding to all of you a recent meditation from **Richard Rohr**, the Franciscan priest I have come to admire, õ**When Crisis Comes**".

I have also recently been re-reading THE PURPOSE DRIVEN LIFE by Rick Warren, pastor of a õmega churchö in California. A line from that jumped out at me, õIt is your job to protect the unity of your church.ö I certainly don¢t believe it resonated with me as my own personal obligation, but it seems to be a worthy task for us all. We¢ve been through a lot, especially over recent weeks. Yet just about every church in our country (and perhaps in our world) must be struggling to unite (or reunite) their church.

In our case that includes uniting the parking lot worshipers with the sanctuary attenders, uniting them all with those who prefer to watch on-line, and most importantly with those we just haven¢t heard from for a while. It involves uniting the vaccinated with the unvaccinated, the masked with the maskless, the Democrats with the Republicans. We want to unite the old with the young as we unite our recent joiners with our longtime members.

I don't pretend to have solutions or answers to these quandaries. I do believe God has provided us with some helpful material. Perhaps the best piece of advice we received was from the February lay convocationô encouraging churches to establish õcommunal prayerö, praying as a faith community that God would guide us all to be the church He wants us to be.

Finally let me leave you with what I consider a gem from Father Rohr,

"Knowing our true identity as sons and daughters of God can save us thousands of dollars in psychotherapy. Knowing that everyone else is a child of God, and treating them as such, can save the world."

Richard Rohr's Daily Meditation From the Center for Action and Contemplation

When Crisis Comes

Living in a transitional age such as ours is scary: things are falling apart, the future is unknowable, so much doesn¢t cohere or make sense. We can¢t seem to put order to it. This is the postmodern panic. It lies beneath most of our cynicism, our anxiety, and our aggression. Yet, there is little in the biblical revelation that ever promised us an ordered universe. The whole Bible is about meeting God in the actual, in the incarnate moment, in the scandal of particularity. It is rather amazing that we ever tried to codify and control the whole thing.

Chaos often precedes great creativity, and faith precedes great leaps into new knowledge. The pattern of transformation begins in order, but it very quickly yields to disorder andô if we stay with it long enough in loveô eventual reordering. Our uncertainty is the doorway into mystery, the doorway into surrender, the path to God that Jesus called õfaith.ö In her work on õcrisis contemplation,ö CAC teacher Barbara Holmes confirms what we and others have long suspectedô that great suffering and great love are the two universal paths of transformation. Both are the ultimate crises for the human ego. Barbara writes:

The crisis begins without warning, shatters our assumptions about the way the world works, and changes our story and the stories of our neighbors. The reality that was so familiar to us is gone suddenly, and we don α t know what is happening....

If life, as we experience it, is a fragile crystal orb that holds our daily routines and dreams of order and stability, then sudden and catastrophic crises shatter this illusion of normalcy. . . . I am referring to oppression, violence, pandemics, abuses of power, or natural disasters and planetary disturbances.

We can identity three common elements in every crisis: The event is usually unexpected, the person or community is unprepared, and there is nothing that anyone could do to stop it from happening.

Even if there are signs everywhere that something is not right, we tend to ignore the warnings and the signposts. Not even sky writing, or messengers from other worlds, would be able to shift our gaze from the comfort of our daily routines.

Thus, the slave catchers, the roundups for native removal, the pandemics, devastating hurricanes, and volcanic eruptions catch us off guard.

When the unexpected happens during a communal crisis, we are not alone. We are with friends and neighboring villagers, and we all experience the same break in reality. Bereft of words, all of us hold the same question: How could this be happening?...

I consider crisis contemplation to be an aspect of disorder that prepares communities for a leap toward the future. This is a leap toward our beginnings. We are not just organisms functioning on a biological level; our sphere of being also includes stardust and consciousness. We all have a spark of divinity within, a flicker of Holy Fire that can be diminished, but never extinguished.

Seeking Church Secretary


Our Redeemerøs United Methodist Church is actively searching for an administrative assistant candidate to fill the position of Church Secretary.
