For hundreds of years, Native Americans, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians, compelled by the gospel, have chosen to become disciples of Jesus Christ. In doing so, we have affirmed that relationship with God and our brothers and sisters is contained in the gospel of Jesus Christ. We bear witness to the mercy of God through our faith, continuing in discipleship and ministry.

Native American Ministries Sunday is a few weeks away. Celebrated on Sunday, May 1, this Special Sunday honors the gifts and contributions of Native Americans.

Last year, our brother **Doug Meneely** brought the *Word of God* for us in a compelling reflection about the contribution of Native Americans to the United Methodist Church. This year, our sister JoAnne Gregorash will

reflect on the life and ministry of Native Americans in the US.

Also, in a few more weeks we will be celebrating the resurrection of the Lord. In the Biblical Story we see that the disciples had heard of the resurrection of Jesus but those who had not seen him did not believe it. They questioned their faith. They are huddled around waiting anxiously.

I know that when I am tense, my hands tend to curl into fists. Perhaps the disciples were experiencing this as well in their fear. Maybe they were ready for a fight. Perhaps they were holding on to what little faith they had with clenched hands. But Jesus, the risen Christ, doesnøt knock with a closed hand. He just appears in the room, saying õPeace be with you.ö

Into their scary, lonely world, Jesus is a voice, a presence. And what does he do? He stretches out his arms and shows them his open, pierced hands. The disciples are immediately relieved. They rejoice. After sharing a meal of broiled fish with them, he õopened their minds.ö They begin to understand the fullness of why Jesus has come. Perhaps in opening their minds, they also begin to open their hands, releasing fear, anger, and the sense of scarcity. Speaking into their disbelief, Jesus tells them that he is sending them out



General Conference Postponed to 2024 Statement from Bishop John L. Hopkins

The Commission on the General Conference has announced the further postponement of the 2020 General Conference of The United Methodist Church. The next General Conference will be in 2024.

In response to the decision, Bishop John L. Hopkins said:

I want to express appreciation to the Commission on General Conference that is made up of elected delegates. They were entrusted to represent General Conference and have consistently upheld the principle of having everyone at the table.

If we believe in a church with a strong democratic foundation, we need to support the decision to meet in 2024 whether we agree with it or not. God does not stop working when we cannot gather at a General Conference and neither should we.

There are many questions about a General Conference in 2024 that we cannot answer at this time. Between now and our annual conference, we will know more about the possibility of electing bishops, changing representatives on church agencies, resetting the general church budget, and how a postponed 2020 conference and a 2024 conference can be held at the same time.

Do not let the news of General Conference being postponed take your attention away from the suffering of our United Methodist churches in Ukraine. I have gathered, sung, and prayed with our United Methodists brothers and sisters in Kyiv and in Moscow who are both led by Bishop Eduard Khegay. Support them with your prayers, offerings, and actions. Your gifts can be received through your local church and designated to Ukrainian assistance.

In the meantime, keep thinking globally and acting locally to serve Jesus and his Church. Use this Lenten Season to focus on what is most important and pray for peace.


