REFLECTIONS ON MY TRIP TO VIETNAM-MARCH, 2023

I praise God for the help He gave me throughout my trip to Vietnam. I felt called to make one more global medical mission trip before I let my medical license expire. This trip provided that opportunity and was a wonderful blessing to me!

I had made three other medical mission trips in the past. In 1991 I went to northern Chile. (In Chile I crossed paths with our Pastor Shirley, and her husband David!) In 1995 I went to Zaire in central Africa to work with Rwandan and Burundian refugees following the uprising in Rwanda.

Then in 2014 I went with Dr Stan Grogg, a pediatric infectious disease specialist, to do medical work in Nicaragua. Each mission trip was a blessing in my life.

I decided I would like to make one more trip with Dr Grogg. Medical service on his trips also involves teaching (and thus influencing) medical students. At first I considered returning to Central Africa-this time Uganda. But the highly dangerous Ebola virus then appeared there this past fall. Eventually I decided to join a trip he was making to Vietnam. I had never been to Asia.

I felt gratitude for never being forced to go to Vietnam and fight, as had so many of my peers. And if we might consider the Vietnamese to be our enemy, it seemed to be a wonderful opportunity and way to "love your

enemy"!

Gail and I were both aware of and concerned about the long and arduous trip. She suggested I contact Diep Shaw, the wife of our late former pastor, Bill Shaw. Diep, ever the educator, set up a Zoom meeting also including her brother, Thang. They gave us helpful and practical advice, yet encouraged and appreciated the endeavor.

Our medical work in Vietnam involved providing care at orphanages in and near Saigon (now called Ho Chi Minh City). The first day was at a Lutheran orphanage, the second at a generic Protestant community center. Our third day was at a Catholic orphanage, and the fourth at a Buddhist orphanage (the most prominent religion in Vietnam.)

The children were kept quite healthy for the most part, although they had not been examined since before the pandemic. Some did have acute infections and others had various chronic diseases. Almost all had numer-(I sincerely told the ous dental cavities. medical students I saw more cavities in those four days than I saw in forty years of pediatric practice.) Leaders of our group arranged to have Vietnamese dental students provide care in the future.

The community center was especially disturbing. The children in the "orphanages" were often not orphans; their mothers simply couldn't support the children and the fathers too often had never been involved. In the community the parents were struggling to parent. We arranged for "Tiny Hearts of Hope",

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a Christian relief agency working in Vietnam, to provide nutritional assistance.

I mentioned earlier the opportunity to teach medical students. I was especially blessed, however, to work with a Vietnamese medical student there. Phuoc served as my interpreter, but had a sincere interest in pediatrics and a desire to learn all she could. How nice to know, although I could only provide care to children four days there, she will for her professional career!

I also mentioned earlier our concerns about the "arduous" travels. Little could I have anticipated what God had in mind for me! Three quarters into the flight between New York and Korea, a passenger experienced a "Grand Mal Seizure".

Now I hadn't functioned as a physician since retiring 2 1/2 years before! But God got us through it all about as well as possible.

We, of course, also enjoyed the opportunity to be tourists in a beautiful and now quite friendly country.

Thank you to our congregation for your interest, support and your prayers. And I thank God for a wonderful "grand finale" to my medical career! Bruce Bedingfield
